Leaving No One Behind

Welcome to the latest issue of Niu Waves, from the IPPF Sub-Regional Office for the Pacific. As always, our work in the last month has focused on ensuring sexual and reproductive health and rights reach everyone, particularly the most marginalised. In May, SROP and the Pacific MAs have, among other things: worked with partners to promote the rights of LGBTQI communities, upskilled our nurses to provide contraceptive options that are convenient and accessible for women living in remote communities, and integrated SRHR with sports to reach marginalised young people in Solomon Islands.

With the Niu Vaka well underway, we have also been looking to the future this month and planning how we can scale delivery to ensure no one is left behind. As such, SROP brought together Pacific MAs and Family Planning New South Wales and New Zealand to plan our work under UNFPA's Transformative Agenda. To support Pacific MAs to move towards sustainability, SROP also hosted an Introduction to Social Enterprise workshop, led by Viti Simmons, SROP Resource Mobilisation Officer.

Our Highlights

- PNGFHA hosted a youth engagement day in Lae, attended by an estimated 300 young people.
- The regional LARCs training was held in Vanuatu, in partnership with FPNSW.
- Rainbow Pride hosted the first Pride march in Suva for the International Day Against Homophobia, Transphobia and Biphobia.
- Australian High Commissioner to Solomon Islands, HE Roderick Brazier, visited SIPPA's Honiara clinic.
- SROP hosted a planning workshop around UNFPA's Transformative Agenda.
- SROP also hosted a one-day social enterprise introduction for Pacific MAs who attended the planning workshop.
- We're looking forward to strong Pacific representation at the Women Deliver conference next week.





Reaching Provincial Youth in PNG

On 28th May, Papua New Guinea Family Health Association (PNGFHA) hosted a youth SRH and SGBV engagement day in Lae, Morobe Province, in partnership with UNFPA PNG, the Provincial Health Authority and local schools.

An estimated 300 young people attended the event, which was filled with music and performances. There were also panel discussions and question and answer sessions for young people to find out more about SRHR. The guest of honour was Mr. Micah Yawing, the Provincial Health Advisor for Morobe Province. Marie Stopes International, Susu Mamas and Femili PNG joined PNGFHA to



provide information and raise awareness of SRHR and SGBV and the support services available.

LARC Training

From 20th to 24th May, Vanuatu Family Health Association (VFHA) hosted a regional Long Acting Reversible Contraception (LARCs) training. Delivered by Family Planning New South Wales, with support from Tarai Nakolinivalu, SROP Quality Improvement Officer, and Monica Burns, Humanitarian SRH Services Advisor, the training brought together clinical staff from across the nine Pacific MAs to upskill themselves on the provision of LARCs.

LARCs, including implants and IUDs, are an important contraceptive option as they remove the need for frequent visits to health centres, which can be difficult and expensive for many women particularly in the Pacific. In 2018 alone, we provided almost 7,000 LARCs across the Pacific.

Following the successful LARC training, Tarai and Monica are conducting quality of care visits to VFHA's clinics in Tanna and Port Vila.

Aus High Commissioner Visits SIPPA

On 17th May, the Australian High Commissioner to Solomon Islands, His Excellency Roderick Brazier, visited the Solomon Islands Planned Parenthood Association (SIPPA) clinic in Honiara.

Mr Brazier thanked the SIPPA staff, volunteers and board members for the work that they do in providing SRH services for the people of Solomon islands, particularly the most vulnerable. Ben Angoa, Executive Director of SIPPA, reiterated SIPPA's commitment to leaving no one behind and ensuring that quality SRH services are available for all.

TFHA at FEMM

Kathy Mafi, Program Manager at Tonga Family Health Association (TFHA), ensured that gender equality and SRHR were on the agenda at the Pacific Islands Forum Secretariat's Forum Economic Ministers Meeting (FEMM), which was held in Suva from 7th to 8th May. As a CSO representative at FEMM, Kathy advocated for the importance of gender equality and its link to financial resilience. From 1st to 5th May, Kathy was also part of the Tongan delegation at the Asian Development Bank's annual meeting in Nadi

CMIS Training

Sera Vulavou, SROP M&E Officer, joined colleagues from across the ESEAOR region in Kuala Lumpur from 20th to 24th May for discussions and further orientation on IPPF's Clinic Management Information Systems (CMIS). Building on the CMIS review in Nepal in 2018, from which the <u>CMIS Learning</u> <u>Document</u> was developed, the sessions focused on CMIS best practices. A technical working group was established and all MAs have been requested to appoint CMIS focal points – Sera will provide further feedback to the SROP team and Pacific MAs shortly.

UNFPA Planning Workshop

From 21st to 23rd May, SROP hosted a workshop to plan our contributions under UNFPA's Transformative Agenda. The workshop brought together Executive Directors of the six Pacific MAs eligible for funding under the Transformative Agenda as well as SROP staff and representatives from both Family Planning New South Wales and Family Planning New Zealand.

The three days were filled with lively discussions and brainstorming on how we can most effectively and efficiently improve sexual and reproductive health services across the Pacific in both stable times and in humanitarian crises.



Participants came away from the workshop with a clearer understanding of the roles that each partner will play in this important piece of work and we look forward to working with UNFPA further in the near future.

Introduction to Social Enterprises

Following the UNFPA planning workshop, the Pacific Executive Directors stayed on in Suva for an introduction to social enterprises, led by Viti Simmons, SROP Resource Mobilisation Officer, on Friday 24th May. The first session focused on the mind-shift necessary for NGOs to become less reliant on donor funds and move towards sustainability before Viti went on to discuss different models for social enterprise and possible next steps for MAs.

Sports & SRHR

Following the success of their Easter sports competition, which reached over 5,000 young people across five sites, the Solomon Islands Planned Parenthood Association (SIPPA) has expanded their integrated sports and SRHR activities to reach more young people, particularly in Honiara's most marginalised communities.

CIFWA's CSE at Church Schools

The Cook Islands Family Welfare Association (CIFWA) has been working closely with the Papaaroa Seven Day Adventist College since last year to deliver Comprehensive Sexuality Education (CSE) for students between 11 and 15 years old. This year, CIFWA have expanded their partnership and are developing a schedule to provide regular CSE sessions, after youth volunteers presented on the program at Papaaroa's PTA AGM last month.

VIA at **SIPPA**

SIPPA has begun using VIA (visual inspection with ascetic acid) to provide cervical screenings to women in remote communities in Solomon Islands who have not been able to attend the clinic in Honiara. Over three days of screening for women in Noro and Munda, the SIPPA nurse screened 79 women, of whom three cases were referred to the provincial hospital.

Vanuatu MISP Training

Aggie Dawainavesi, Humanitarian Capacity Development and Partnerships Advisor, is in Vanuatu from 20th to 31st May to support Vanuatu Family Health Association (VFHA) deliver MISP training in Santo. VFHA will deliver two consecutive MISP trainings, one targeting program managers and one targeting clinical staff. These trainings are designed to improve staff's ability to deliver life-saving sexual and reproductive health services in a crisis setting.

Papua New Guinea SGBV Consultation and Fundamentals Training

Petra, Humanitarian Gender Specialist, will be in Papua New Guinea from 3rd to 14th June to consult with Papua New Guinea Family Health Association (PNGFHA) and key SGBV stakeholders before conducting Sexual and Gender Based Violence fundamentals training the following week.
